## Diary of a Somebody to play in London after 35 year hiatus as part of Seven Dials Playhouse Spring 2022 Season

John Lahr's *Diary of a Somebody* will be the exciting second show in the Seven Dials Playhouse Spring 2022 season. Directed by Nico Rao Pimparé (*The Start of Nothing*, 2020; *Rainer*, Arcola Theatre; *Candy*, King's Head Theatre) and presented in association with Seven Dials Playhouse, this dramatisation of *The Orton Diaries* chronicles the last eight months of notorious artist and playwright Joe Orton's life. The diaries track Orton's growing theatrical celebrity and the corresponding punishing effect it had on his relationship with friend and mentor Kenneth Halliwell who murdered him on 9<sup>th</sup> August 1967 and then took his own life.

Diary of a Somebody first premiered at the National Theatre in 1986, directed by Jonathan Myerson, where the Evening Standard called it 'perversely enjoyable'. The production at Seven Dials Playhouse will be Diary of a Somebody's first London revival in 35 years. The play incorporates Orton's words from his diaries, letters and literary fragments, as well as psychiatric reports.

John Lahr, writer of Diary of a Somebody comments, the diary contained Orton's unique merciless, hilarious voice (...) the diary, it seemed to me, could make an extraordinary first-person spine to a biography. Its well-written, unabashed observations held the drama of the grief, violence and absurdity Orton found in life—the dross his comic alchemy turned into theatrical gold.

Darren Murphy, producer of *Diary of a Somebody* comments, *I am thrilled to be bringing* Diary of a Somebody back to a London stage, an absence of 35 years. With this being extra special for me as it is my first production in almost 2 years. The play is an extraordinary insight into the minds of one of our best loved playwrights, Joe Orton, and his turbulent relationship with his partner Kenneth Halliwell that ended tragically with their untimely deaths.

Seven Dials Playhouse opened in February 2022 with *Steve* directed by Andrew Keates. It seeks to provide opportunities for people to collaborate on bold, creative and high quality work while providing journeys of enlightenment and entertainment for artists and audiences alike.

Mitchell Reeve, Executive Creative Producer at Seven Dials Playhouse comments, It is an honour and a privilege to finally open the doors of Seven Dials Playhouse with such a wonderful Spring 2022 season. I look forward to welcoming audiences to Seven Dials Playhouse this Spring and to see our very first season.

## **Joe Orton**

Joe Orton was an English playwright and author. His public career was short but prolific, lasting from 1964 until his death three years later. During this brief period he shocked, outraged, and amused audiences with his scandalous black comedies. His first play to be staged, Entertaining Mr Sloane, won the London Critics' 'Variety' Award as the best play of 1964. Loot, his second play to be staged, won the Evening Standard Drama Award for the best play of 1966. The Ruffian on the Stair and The Erpingham Camp were performed as a double bill at the Royal Court Theatre in June 1967 under the title Crimes of Passion. His television plays, The Good and Faithful Servant and Funeral Games, were shown in 1967 and 1968. What The Butler Saw, his last play, was staged in 1969 and won a 1970 'Obie' Award for the best off-Broadway foreign play in New York. Both Entertaining Mr Sloane and Loot have been filmed. Orton also wrote a screenplay for the Beatles which was never filmed, but was subsequently published as Up Against It. The novels, Head to Toe, Between Us Girls, The Boy Hairdresser and Lord Cucumber, and the play Fred & Madge were published posthumously.
